*Harperocallis flava*

**Plant Threat Level:**

Endangered

Harper's beauty has been federally listed as Endangered since 1979, but the few remaining populations have been decreasing since then, due to fire suppression, mowing and altering site hydrology. For about four weeks every spring, the long-leafed plant sprouts a solitary yellow flower. Harper's beauty occurs in sun-dappled slopes, cypress swamps, pitcher plant bogs and today is sometimes seen in open, moist roadside ditches. It is found in only a few locations within a small area of the Apalachicola National Forest in the Florida Panhandle.
