Chionanthus pygmaeus, the pygmy fringe tree, is endemic to the sandy soils of dry hammocks and pine forests in central Florida. The pygmy fringe tree depends on the open and exposed conditions it requires. It has adapted the ability to re-sprout from the roots after these historic, periodic burns. Much of its habitat of natural hammocks has been lost to residential development and citrus production. Suppression of the naturally occurring fires has also impeded its growth. As a result, *Chionanthus pygmaeus* is now endangered, along with other plants occurring in the same habitat, such as Chapman oak, turkey oak, myrtle oak and sand pines. The U.S. Botanic Garden and other organizations are working on others in the protection of this plant species.
